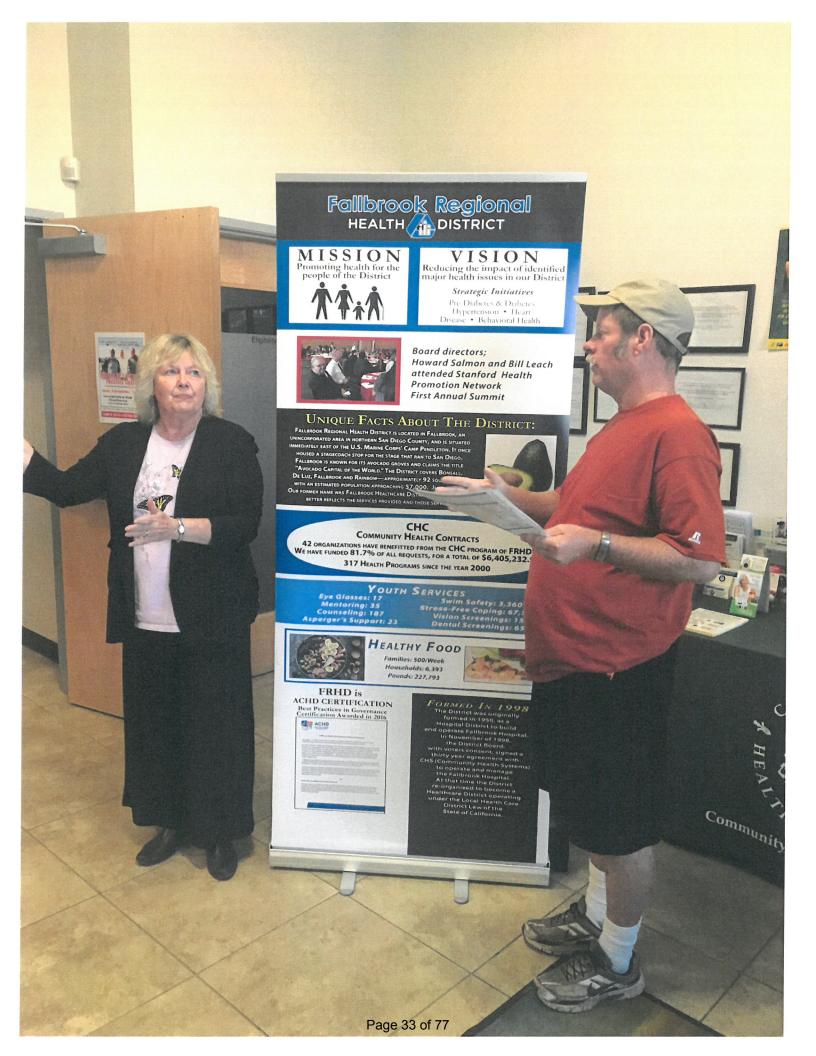

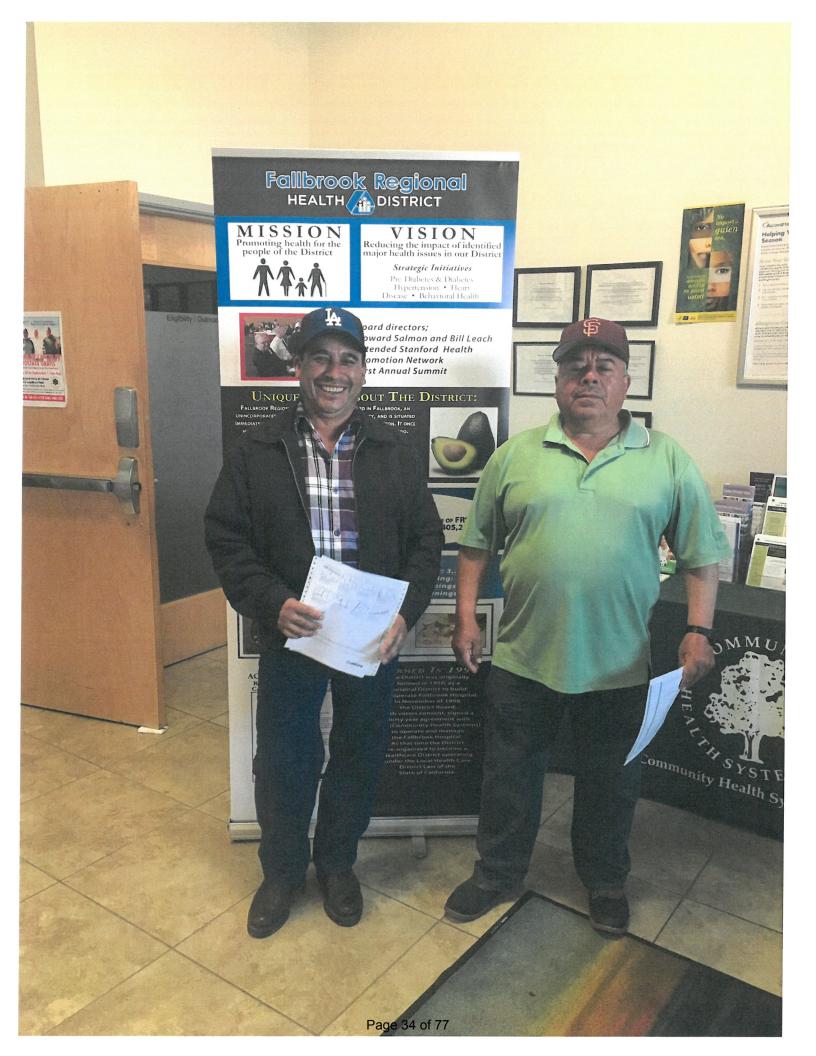

Governor Takes Action on Budget Trailer Bills

On Saturday, within hours of the Legislature wrapping up its 2017 work, the Governor signed seven of the eight trailer bills sent to him in the last week of session. Details on each of the measures can be found on page 3.

The Future of the Affordable Care Act

Senator John McCain (R-AZ) announced opposition today to the Graham-Cassidy-Heller-Johnson proposal, a last-ditch effort to repeal and replace the Affordable Care Act (ACA). In a prepared statement, Senator McCain said he "cannot in good conscience vote for the Graham Cassidy proposal. I believe we could do better working together, Republicans and Democrats, and have not yet really

Worth Noting: First End-of-Session with 72-Hour Rule

In approving Proposition 54 in November 2016, voters clipped the Legislature's wings a bit. The initiative requires that before the Legislature may take action on a bill, it must be in print for at least 72 hours. Gone are the days of "mushroom" bills that sprout in the dark of night and are passed swiftly with little to no opportunity for meaningful policy review.

In practical terms, the 72-hour rule meant that – given that the Legislature's final day to conduct business for the year was September 15 – amendments had to be in print by Tuesday, September 12. While we will never really know what the new restriction may have prevented, the new rule certainly changed the end-of-session dynamic. Read more on CalMatters' perspective on this development here.

tried. Nor could I support it without knowing how much it will cost, how it will (affect) insurance premiums, and how many people will be helped or hurt by it. Without a full CBO score, which won't be available by the end of the month, we won't have reliable answers to any of those questions." The full statement can be read here.

Senator Paul had announced opposition to Graham-Cassidy last week. Senator Collins is expected to announce her opposition, as well. With these developments, it appears this last-minute effort to take advantage of the budget reconciliation process to enact an ACA repeal and replace.

The UC Berkeley Labor Center released a September 19 <u>analysis</u> of the proposal's impact on California. The measure would have had a disproportionate impact on California. The brief projects that California would lose \$27.8 billion in federal funds in 2026, growing to \$57.5 billion in 2027. Anthony Wright of Health Access California had this to say: "Why isn't the headline in every California newspaper, 'GRAHAM CASSIDY TO CA: DROP DEAD.' Literally."

In total, 6.7 million Californians would lose coverage in 2027 with the elimination of the Graham-Cassidy block grant and under the scenario in which the state responds to the per capita cap provisions by cutting Medi-Cal eligibility or capping enrollment for certain eligibility groups. That is equal to the entire population of the Bay Area – Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, San Francisco, San Mateo, and Santa Clara counties combined. The Labor Center also provides estimates of coverage losses by county and by Congressional district.

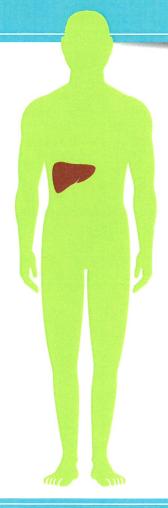

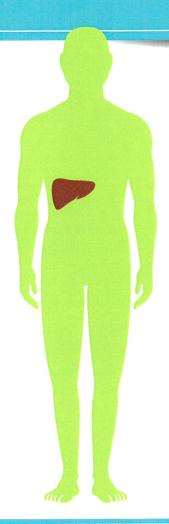

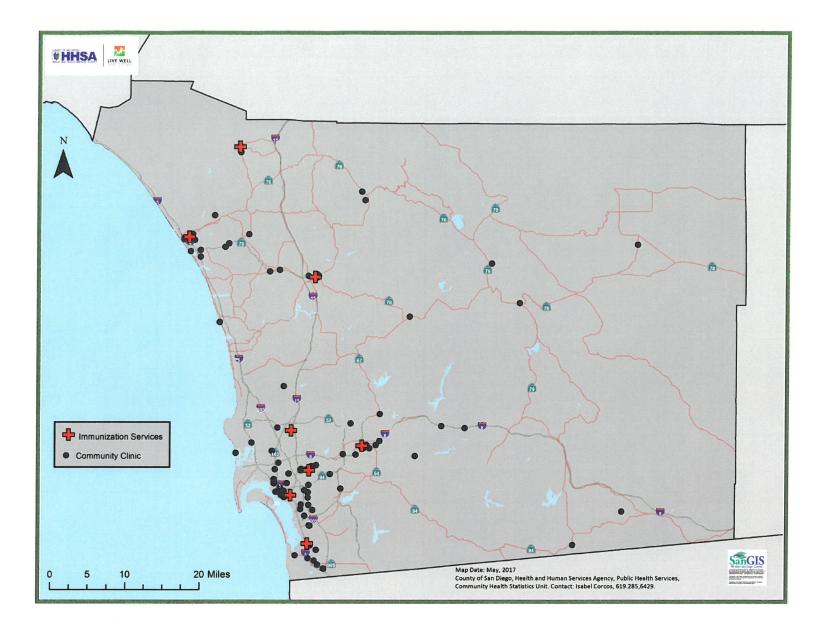

FRHD to host two community forums on public meeting space, urgent care services Sept. 27 and 28

FALLBROOK – The Fallbrook Regional Health District, which recently voted unanimously to sell the former Fallbrook Hospital, will host two separate community forums to discuss potential uses for public meeting space and an open dialog about urgent care services.

The community forum on public meeting space will take place on Wednesday, Sept. 27 followed by the urgent care services community forum on Thursday, Sept. 28. Both meetings will happen from 1:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the Fallbrook Library, 124 S. Mission Road. For more information on the community forums, contact pknox@fallbrookhealth.org.

"During our recent public meetings on the sale of the former hospital, two questions often came up: 'Can the district create a public meeting space?' and 'Can we expand urgent care services beyond what's already being provided?" said executive director Bobbi Palmer. "The Fallbrook Regional Health District wants these two community forums to serve as an open dialog to revisit both topics and allow us drill down to some more specifics."

On Sept. 27, district staff will lead discussions around some possible uses already mentioned at public meetings including, health center activities, non-profit business meetings, computer lab and support groups.

"The Fallbrook Regional Health District agrees the community could benefit from more public meeting space," Palmer said. "We welcome any and all ideas on how to best serve our residents."

While the Sept. 28 meeting will focus on any improvements or expansion upon urgent care services in the Fallbrook Regional Health District area. Currently, local urgent care services available at A+ Urgent Care, Fallbrook Medical Center/ Urgent Care and Fallbrook Family Health Center include: complete laboratory services, electrocardiograms, primary care for adults and children, preventative and restorative dental care for adults and children, minor surgical procedures, prenatal and maternal services, health education, teen counseling, child health and disability program, optometry, and well baby and well child exams.

"Our urgent care clinics accept virtually all programs and even offer sliding-fee scale for those without coverage," Palmer said. "Patients care ranges from preventative care and prenatal to even electrocardiograms and sprains. We want nothing but the best for our community and welcome ideas to improve our urgent care services."

The voter-approved special district collects roughly \$1.6 million annually to cover health care provider shortages, uninsured Californians, patients with low or fixed incomes, and underserved populations.

Since 2000, the district community health contracts have supported more than 270 health programs offering no-cost services for the North San Diego County unincorporated communities of Bonsall, Del Luz, Fallbrook and Rainbow.

In the last five years, the District granted about \$3 million in health services benefiting the public.

three articles in this issue deal with government agencies increasing fees. Each time the state/county does this, the taxpayers quality of live decreases, we do not get pay increases to match. WOW program shows how to melt pain away

Fallbrook Regional Health District (FRHD) sponsored its latest Woman of Wellness program Sept. 7 with Pilates instructor Kat-Folger introducing the MELT Method®, a self-treatment technique that reduces pain.

Folger was introduced by FRHD special projects coordinator Pam Knox, who is taking MELT classes with her. Knox said her own pain and stiffness have improved since starting the class a few months ago, so she invited Folger to explain the method in a WOW program at Fallbrook Library.

More than 60 women and men attended the presentation and were able to use small rubber hand and foot balls to try out the exercises as Folger demonstrated them. The science-based MELT hand and foot treatment puts pressure on targeted locations on the hands and feet to rehydrate the connective tissues in the body, making it feel and function better.

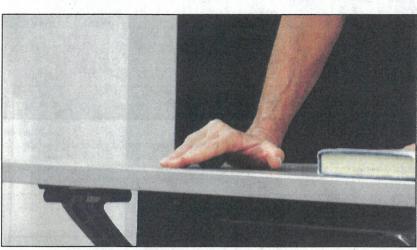
Folger said a lot of people are in pain, even athletes and trainers. The pain comes from the nervous system and, more than anything else, the connective tissue in the hands, feet and spine.

Exercises with the balls can be done daily while sitting or

standing. A soft foam roller can be used to treat the spine in similar exercises. "The intelligent body can adapt, improve, get better, Folger said. MELT addresses the "stuck stress" caused by repetition [of activities], she added.

Even before pain starts, people need to restore and rebalance their connective tissues as they age. "Healthy connective tissue absorbs water," she explained and, when it is not healthy, it does not function well which causes pain.

As it ages, the body becomes inefficient and barriers develop inside as the connective tissue becomes dehydrated. According to Folger, this is why 85 percent

of athletes are in pain. "Rehydrate so you don't have issues with your tissues," she advised.

It is important to assess how one's body feels before starting MELT exercises, and then reassess afterwards, "giving the body a chance to be aware of change," Folger said.

She had everyone take their socks and shoes off, and drink some water before starting the exercises standing up. She then had them take a deep breath and, eyes closed, allow their bodies to sense any tension present. Next, she instructed them to lift all 10 toes and feel how the body's autopilot supports it as its center of gravity is altered.

Using different size rubber balls depending on the exercise, Folger had the participants lean on the ball at several different points in the bottom of their feet and the palms of their hands. Each person determined how much pressure to use; "we don't create pain to get out of pain," she said.

Just as the hands are constantly used every day, the feet carry the body's weight throughout the day. The MELT treatment not only relieves foot pain, it also helps alleviate tension in the low back and spine, Folger said.

In one exercise, a rubber band is used, around the two big toes together, along with one of the small balls between those toes, to lubricate the tendon of the bigtoe and prevent or reduce painful bunions in just a few minutes a day. These exercises can help with issues in other parts of the body too, Folger said.

Executive Director Bobbi Palmer Addresses Peers at Annual Meeting in San Diego

FALLBROOK, Calif. (Sept. 18, 2017) ---- The Fallbrook Regional Health District presented before peers statewide on website compliance at the Association of California Healthcare Districts 65th Annual Meeting held recently at the Kona Kai Resort & Spa in San Diego.

The lunch session addressed the various public information access points the district undertakes to make available through its website at www.fallbrookhealth.org. Led by Executive Director Bobbi Palmer, along with Administrative Assistant Linda Bannerman and the district's website contractor, Sloane Dell'Orto of Streamline, they covered various pressing legal requirements mandated by various laws.

"Websites today must make access to information as easy as possible for the public," Palmer said. "Our website allows citizens to make public records act requests, they can view all our financial reports and they have access to our meeting agendas and minutes."

A bill expected to be signed this year and enacted in 2018, AB 1728, applies specifically to health care districts, some of which do not have websites or enough legally-required information readily available to the public.

"Fallbrook Regional Health District is proud to lead the charge on being as open and compliant as possible," Palmer said. "We hope our presentation provided our health district peers with valuable information to create a higher standard of public information access across California."

This year's Annual Meeting of Association of California Healthcare Districts focused on preparing health care districts for the challenges ahead and the role of Districts in the face of change.

Fallbrook Hospital \$4.5M Sale Closes Escrow

Fallbrook Regional Health District Sells Closed Facility to Crestwood Behavioral Health

FALLBROOK, Calif. (Oct. 2, 2017) ---- On September 29, the <u>Fallbrook Regional Health District</u> received confirmation of escrow closing on the \$4.5 million sale of the closed Fallbrook Hospital to Crestwood Behavioral Health Inc. The new owners will break ground soon on renovations to reopen as the <u>Fallbrook Healing Center</u>.

After nearly three years of searching for a buyer, Crestwood opted to buy the facility that will take patients through county health department referrals. On May 10, the health district board voted unanimously to sell the vacant building at 624 East Elder to Crestwood and ratified the sale at a special meeting on July 28 with an intended close of escrow on July 31.

However, the health district was notified by the County of San Diego that the property required resolution of a lot line adjustment and a 1989 lien agreement before close of escrow.

"The Fallbrook Healing Center will revitalize that building and bring much-needed health care services to our community," said board President Gordon Tinker. "We're excited to work with Crestwood and their exceptional team on the next steps, which will mean investment and added jobs in our community."

The close of escrow comes after several regular and special board meetings where more than 300 residents shared feedback with the district board on the sale of the public property. Board members tabled the item at its July 12 regular meeting to do more fact-finding, including personal tours of Crestwood facilities, to address questions raised by the community.

The 50-year-old Fallbrook Hospital closed in November 2014 after soliciting proposals from more than 10 health systems in the region. Several more proposals and offers fell through in the years following as the Fallbrook Regional Health District spent about \$200,000 a year on basic maintenance and security of the building.

The Fallbrook Hospital was last managed under a 30-year lease agreement by Tennessee-based Community Health Systems. The company closed the hospital's labor and delivery department in September 2014 and announced it planned to shutter emergency and intensive care departments in November of that year. CHS reported to shareholders it lost nearly \$6 million operating Fallbrook Hospital in 2013 alone.

Fallbrook's situation is not unique. Since 2010, a <u>report</u> found that at least 82 rural hospitals have closed across the country with another 700 at risk of closure.

"The board served the Fallbrook Regional Health District and its constituency with the utmost integrity throughout this long, trying process," said Executive Director Bobbi Palmer, MBA, MSW. "Their superb and steadfast leadership ultimately paved the way to reduce barriers to quality health care and cut district costs which allow us to support 35 percent more community health needs for our residents."

The 100-bed Fallbrook Health Center will bring 108 full-time permanent positions and another 10 part-time positions in addition to the immediate construction jobs. Crestwood has committed at least \$2 million for the construction project, though company representatives said it could cost the company up to \$4 million.

"We are delighted to be the newest member of the Fallbrook community," said Executive Vice President Patty Blum, Ph.D., of Crestwood Behavioral Health Inc. "Today is an exciting and monumental day. This was a long and important community discussion and the result will be to preserve the provision of healthcare at the Fallbrook Hospital site while providing much need behavioral health services."

The project plans to break ground in the coming months and open in 2018.

WORKING HOURS, SICK LEAVE, OVERTIME, AND VACATION PAY

The following provisions are applicable for all non-exempt employees, except those whose employment is covered by a separate contract with the District.

A. Working Hours.

Regular working hours for all non-exempt employees are forty (40) hours per week, Monday through Friday, excluding one hour duty-free, mid-day meal period.

B. Sick Leave.

Sick leave with pay shall be granted to all employees at the rate of one (1) hour per every thirty (30) hours worked; a full-time employee (2,080 hours/year) shall earn seventy (70) hours of paid sick leave per year. Unused sick leave may be carried over to the next year. Accrual of unused sick leave shall be capped at 90 days.

Upon Termination, all accumulated sick leave shall be forfeited by the employee and shall not be eligible for compensation or lump sum payment at termination of employment.

C. Overtime.

Overtime is defined as any hour or part thereof worked in excess of eight (8) hours per week, or forty (40) hours per week. There may be occasional need to work overtime hours, which shall be non-compulsory. Overtime hours shall be compensated at an hourly rate, in accordance with applicable state and federal law.

D. Vacation Pay.

Nonexempt District employees shall earn vacation from the date of employment on a pro rata basis. During the first five (5) years, employees shall be entitled to ten (10) workdays per year. After five years of service, employees shall be entitled to fifteen (15) workdays per year. Vacation time may be takes incrementally with advance approval of the Executive Director.

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E. Vacation/Accrual Limitation.

The maximum amount of unused vacation time that may be carried over to a new calendar year shall be the amount of vacation time that an employee is entitles to accrue in two consecutive anniversary years ("the vacation cap"). For an employee in the first five (5) years of service, he or she will be allowed to carry over a maximum of twenty (20) days of vacation into the third year. Further accrual of vacation time will not occur until the employee had taken at least ten (10) days of vacation and is under that vacation cap level of accrued, unused time.

F. Holidays.

All nonexempt District employees are entitled to receive compensation for all District observed Holidays. Full time employees shall receive a full eight hours of holiday pay, while part time employees shall receive four hours of pay per holiday. The District shall observe the following Holiday Schedule:

- 1. New Years' Day
- 2. Martin Luther King Day
- 3. Presidents Day
- 4. Memorial Day
- 5. Independence Day
- 6. Labor Day
- 7. Admissions Day*
- 8. Columbus Day*
- 9. Veterans' Day
- 10. Thanksgiving Day
- 11. Christmas Day

With advanced notice and approval of the Executive Director, employees may be allowed to float designated (*) holidays to coincide with other calendar dates, not to exceed more than two (2) consecutive holidays from work in any given calendar month. Current practice of the District is to float the (*) designated holidays for use on the Friday after Thanksgiving and Christmas Eve Day.

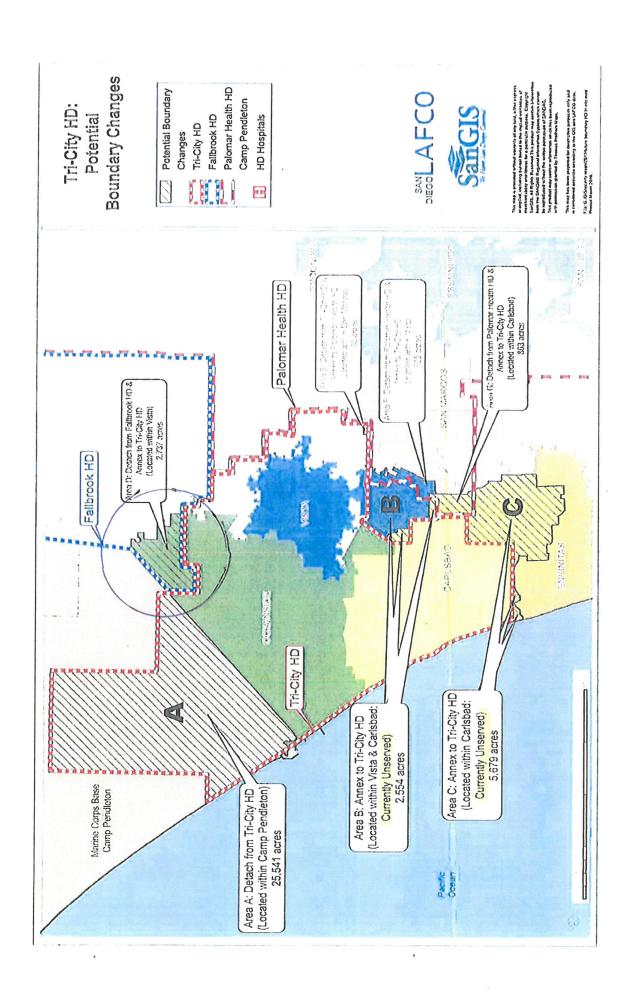

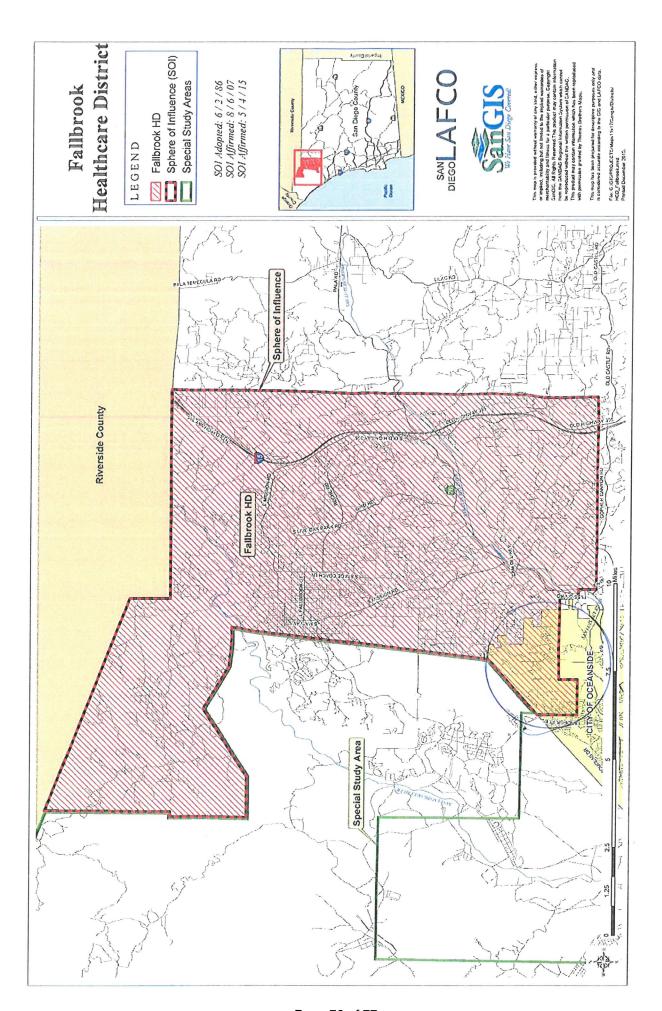
adjustment with Fallbrook Regional Health District

Just prior to the Regular Board meeting last month, our office was contacted by Tri-City's General Counsel, Adriana Ochoa, who advised that our neighboring District was processing an application to San Diego LAFCO to adjust boundaries between the respective Districts. This adjustment, consisting of roughly 2,737 acres of FRHD's operating territory (about 3% of the total), represents the southwest portion of the FRHD lying within the Oceanside city limits.

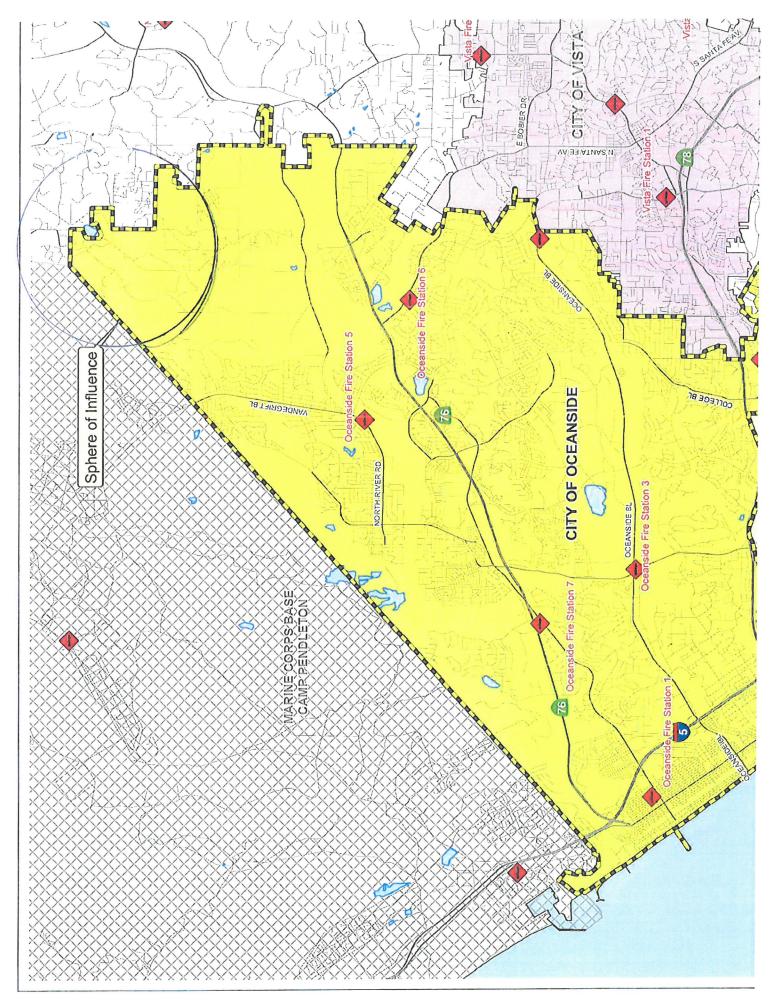
Ms. Ochoa was requesting that FRHD Board consider the application request and advise whether or not FRHD would stand in opposition. I have reviewed the maps in question (see attached maps 1 through 3) and re-visited LAFCO's Municipal Services Review report from 2015 pertaining to Health Districts ("MSR Report"). The area which Tri-City seeks to detach from FRHD and add to its boundary is consistent with recommendations made in the MSR report.

The principal impact of this would be financial and given the projected property tax revenues next year of \$1,800,000, a 3% loss of taxable property area would result in a net negative to the District of \$54,000.00 going forward. This number could fluctuate in either direction depending on the changes in assessed value for the individual parcels in question - i.e. how recently these have changed ownership and how the assessed values have been impacted. That said, the loss of revenue alone is scant justification for objecting to the change recommended in the MSR report. If the Board wished to go on record in opposition to the application, a motion, second and a vote to so would be appropriate.





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
