 A decrease in properly tax revenue was noted and is expected to return to normal as we have seen the tax increases occur two times a year.

8) Check Detail as of February 2017 A check detail was included in the Finance Committee packet for review, and will be included in future packets as well.

A recommendation was made to have the Board of Directors consider a budget increase in the near future due to the annual granting of Community Health Contracts. Each year new requests are made and presented to the Board for consideration. We are fast approaching this time period. In order to have funds earmarked for the proposed possible increases, it is worthy of discussion. More information will be made available to the Finance Committee within the next 30 days to better prepare for a specific dollar amount.

The next Finance Committee meeting will be May 3rd.

MINUTES

A. CALL MEETING TO ORDER - PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

President Tinker called the meeting to order at 6:02 p.m. and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Present: Directors Salmon, Tinker, Mroz and Leach

Also present: Legal Counsel Blaise Jackson and Executive Director Bobbi Palmer.

B. ADDITIONS TO AGENDA

None

C. BOARD MEMBER AND PUBLIC COMMENTS – 6:15pm to 7:30pm

President Tinker welcomed all present to the Town Hall portion of the meeting. He reviewed actions taken by the District in the past year which focused on working collaboratively with other organizations in the community to provide health & wellness services. Some of the actions include the following: Hired a new Executive Director Bobbi Palmer; Revised the Mission Statement to "promoting health for the people of the District; Hired CentraForce to do a health data collection study to determine health disparities in our District. Results indicated our District has higher rates of Diabetes, Pre-diabetes, Hypertension, Heart Disease, and Behavioral Health than in other areas of the County. In addition, the grant program has been redesigned to a Community Health Contract with the intent of meeting some of these health needs through issuing Community Health Contracts to those organizations who will address these needs. There is a new Advisory Committee meeting prior to each Board meeting. A Joint Powers Agreement was signed with North County Fire Protection District to address the common interest of emergency medical services. Discussions are ongoing regarding a pilot EMS community health navigation system (in conjunction with the Foundation for Senior Care) recognizing significant gaps in the current system. This would be based on a first responder model that has been tested in other communities.

Executive Director Bobbi Palmer introduced the Advisory Committee and thanked them for their input regarding a direction for the District. She said Food is Medicine, Exercise is Medicine and Prevent the Preventable are all representative of our new direction. We now focus on health, wellness and prevention.

Attendees had been asked to complete a Request to Speak Form if they wanted to address the Board of Directors. Each speaker was asked to limit their comments to no more than five minutes. President Tinker noted that questions would be responded to at the next Town Hall/Board meeting on May 10th. Mrs. Sandra Buckingham addressed the Board about using the facility to promote preventive care. Ms. Miryam Padilla spoke to the board about the need for treatment and prevention of alcohol and drug abuse in the community. Vi Dupre asked the board to consider mental health uses for the old hospital facility. Mr. John Watson stressed the importance and value of a senior wellness/cardio fitness facility. Mr. Roger Milner expressed concerns about District expenditures and health care purposes. Mr. Keith Jameson asked to Board to consider the importance of the facility economically, recalling that the hospital was the second largest employer in town before it closed.

F. REPORTS

- F1. Finance Committee Committee of the Whole, Chair: Director Mroz Committee Chair Barbara Mroz presented the Finance Committee report for the April 5th meeting. An overview of the financial statements for February 2017 found them to be in order. The outstanding variance in payments was due to distribution of the community health contracts. The LAIF account balance was \$1,445,721.62 and the Cal Trust account balance was \$4,234,218.84. The profit and loss, actual vs. budget, reflected the District was under budget, with administrative costs down by \$54,060.00. The Finance Committee recommended that the Board of Directors consider allocating additional funding for Community Health Contracts in the fiscal year 2017-2018.
- F2. Gov't/Public Relation/Community Relations Committee Directors Salmon and Tinker Committee Chair Howard Salmon reported that he and Executive Director Bobbi Palmer had attended the recent ACHD Legislative Day seminar in Sacramento. He said he met with Assembly Member Cecilia Aguiar-Curry who serves as Chair of the Assembly Local Government Committee. He said the Little Hoover Commission will be meeting again at a yet to be determined date to further consider special districts. He said all health districts want to assure that health services will continue to be available to the residents of the districts and are monitoring the repeal and replacement of the Affordable Care Act.
- F3. Facilities/Strategic Planning Committee Directors Abbott and Salmon President Tinker reported that the Facilities Committee had met this week and will continue discussions at an upcoming workshop.
- F4. Executive Director Bobbi Palmer

 Bobbi Palmer said she and Director Salmon had attended the ACHD Legislative Day on April 3rd in Sacramento and met with local legislators, noting the importance of keeping them informed regarding the role and relevance of the District. They both also attended the Stanford Health Promotion Network Annual Summit in March with Director Leach.

A. CALL MEETING TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 a.m. by President Tinker.

B. DISCUSSION ITEMS

- B1. Feedback from Town Hall & Coffee Chat
 Bobbi Palmer shared a press release written by Community Engagement Consultant Erica
 Holloway covering the recent Town Hall/Board meeting on April 12th. In addition a couple of
 members of the community attended a Coffee Chat with Bobbi Palmer and Linda Bannerman on
 April 20th and their comments/concerns were discussed. In addition, Director Salmon
 suggested, and there was consensus, that the Board President and Executive Director draft
 responses to the questions and concerns that arose at the Town Hall and provide them to the
 other members of the Board for review prior to the next Town Hall/Board meeting.
- B2. Commercial Real Estate Brokerage/Land Use Consulting Services
 Roy Moosa, contracted Real Estate consultant, joined the meeting remotely by teleconference.
 Mr. Moosa presented information on a property that the District might have use for as a center for wellness and educational services. There was discussion including zoning questions, and potential costs. Following discussion, the Board directed Executive Director Bobbi Palmer to ask Mr. Moosa to continue his consulting efforts on behalf of the District.
- B3. Health & Wellness
 - B3a. What is a Wellness Center?

 Bobbi Palmer shared with the members of the Board that a Wellness Center is not a Fitness Center or a Gym. She shared an article discussing medical fitness centers and gyms. There was discussion regarding a Wellness Center and what services it might include. There was discussion regarding including physicians in the process as well.
 - B3b. Olivewood Community Garden/Learning Center Model
 Bobbi Palmer had recently taken staff to visit Olivewood Gardens in National City. Many photos of the facility were shared. Organic gardening takes place, students visit to tour the gardens, cooking and science classes are offered and much more. Since the District has been focused on health, wellness and prevention, this serves as a model for what might be accomplished in our communities. It fits into Food is Medicine and Prevent the Preventable concepts and programs. The Blue Zone is another concept used by Beach Cities Health District in California as well. Again, there was discussion regarding including physicians in the process.

B4. Communications Only Information items had been included in the packet.

Following these discussions it was determined that a closed session may be needed at the next regular board meeting regarding real estate negotiations for the former hospital property

Fallbrook Regional Health District Hosted Town Hall

More Than 100 Residents Attended Meeting to Hear About Future Plans

FALLBROOK, Calif. (April 14, 2017) ---- The Fallbrook Regional Health District hosted the first of two consecutive town halls during a regular board meeting on Wednesday, April 12 drawing more than 100 interested residents to hear about future plans for community health.

The District Board of Directors sought public feedback on the sale of public land at 624 E. Elder Street, formerly operating as the <u>Fallbrook Hospital</u> and its annex buildings. The District intends to identify suitable medical services to address identified local health concerns, including cancer, diabetes and hypertension.

The voter-approved <u>special district</u> collects roughly \$1.6 million annually to cover health care provider shortages, uninsured Californians, patients with low or fixed incomes, and underserved populations.

Since 2000, the district <u>community health contracts</u> have supported more than 270 health programs offering <u>no-cost services</u> for the North San Diego County unincorporated communities of Fallbrook, Bonsall, Rainbow and De Luz. In the last five years, the District granted about \$3 million in health services benefiting the public.

With a largely 55-plus population, many District contracts support senior programs offering transportation, health screenings and education as well as nutritious food options, including those delivered to the home.

"Fallbrook residents take community involvement to a whole new level," said Executive Director Bobbi Palmer of the Fallbrook Regional Health District. "We were delighted with the town hall turnout and high interest in the fact sheets, annual report and other data points, which are also available on our website." www.fallbrookhealth.org

Other health contracts support underserved families and youth by offering dental and eye exams, access to a local food pantry, disability support and mental and behavioral health services.

In addition to contractual services, Fallbrook Regional Health District directly operates <u>health programs</u> including the Community Collaborative Health & Wellness Committee, Fallbrook Community Healthcare Resource Directory, Healthcare Hero, monthly Woman of Wellness (WOW) program, North County Community Collaborative Health Initiative and Wellness Walks that are held monthly.

The second town hall will take place at 6 p.m. on May 10 at the Fallbrook Public Utility District, 990 E. Mission Road in Fallbrook.

Fallbrook Regional Health District and property taxes

FALLBROOK – Many residents have questions and misperceptions regarding the funding of Special Districts through property taxes. In an effort to clarify the matter, Fallbrook Regional Health District has provided the following brief history followed by answers to most commonly asked questions.

Fallbrook (Hospital) Healthcare District was a government entity operating under the Local Health Care District Law. In 1950, the residents of the area voted to establish, build and operate Fallbrook Hospital. In 1971, the hospital was enlarged to a 47-bed capacity. In November 1998, the hospital was leased under a 30-year agreement to Community Health Systems (CHS). In July of 2015 the hospital officially closed as it was no longer financially viable and the services could not be sustained.

If the District is dissolved, will our property taxes be reduced?

No. You will continue to pay the same amount of property tax.

Why do I not see the health district listed on my property tax bill?


It is included in the 1 percent rate that is shared by many local governments. The 1 percent rate generates most of the revenue from the property tax bill – roughly \$43 billion in 2010-11. On a typical property tax bill, however, the 1 percent rate is listed as the general tax levy or countywide rate with no indication as to which local governments receive the revenue or for what purpose the funds are used. In general, county auditors allocate revenue from the 1 percent rate to a variety of local governments within the county pursuant to a series of complex state statutes. What happens to the revenue if the District is dissolved?

It will be reallocated and distributed to another local government receiving revenue from the 1 percent rate.

Transparency test: Seeking web browser histories of local officials

etropolitan Transit District Chief Executive Officer Paul Jablonski spent 52 minutes of the first day of March on a website that features videos about how to fly fish, records show.

Cardiff School District Superintendent Jill Vinson browsed on Ticketmaster.com five minutes into opening a

And Julian Union School District Superintendent Brian Duffy watched Tim Tebow arrive at New York Mets spring training in a Facebook video.

Each internet episode occurred on a mid-week work day on the public agency's wired or wireless network.

U-T Watchdog in March requested the web activity of more than 100 top public officials in San Diego County as part of an annual Sunshine Week exercise to bring attention to issues of transparency in government.

The request sought records of web activity, including sites visited and the time and duration of the visits by the official. To limit the volume of information requested, the U-T sought the traffic for that single day, March 1.

If the agency could not fulfill the request for the day in question — for example, if the city manager was out of the office — the Watchdog agreed to another date in March. The U-T has received the documents from 40 of the agencies contacted under the California Public Records Act.

Thirteen agencies provided the web-activity logs within four business days — including the cities of Coronado, Del Mar, Encinitas, Escondido, Imperial Beach, San Marcos and Vista. The county also responded in that timeframe, as did the Helix and Olivenhain water districts, Mountain Empire and San Dieguito school districts and MiraCosta Community College.

Twenty-seven agencies provided the records in more than four business days, including the Metropolitan Transit District, which revealed Jablonski's fly-fishing activity.

The remaining agencies have either declined the requests or are still processing them.

Loss of productivity

At MTS, Jablonski was granted a raise in March - retroactive to Jan. 1 - placing his annual salary at \$371,316.

Via email, he said he was searching for a birthday gift on the fly-fishing website for 15 minutes on a lunch break on March 1.

MTS uses Barracuda Networks Web Filter, and the documents released were produced using that software, which is designed to measure active web use. The records log 52 minutes at howtoflyfish.orvis.com between 1 p.m. and 2 p.m.

An MTS spokesman said that the longer time period shown in district records was the result of an inactive tab left open on Jablonski's web browser.

In addition to the flyfishing site, Jablonski visited a camping reservation website and a religious school website in the angen hour

The Cardiff School District's content-filtering software has a risk-class category for "productivity loss," which includes entertainment and shopping websites.

Superintendent Vinson spent almost 10 percent of her internet usage on websites in this category on March 1, records show.

Vinson's executive assistant, Martha Bailey, said the district could not comment on how "productivity loss" is categorized, but "items that are routinely disseminated throughout the education community, such as education news and media, have been categorized under this heading."

Via email, Vinson said that the Union-Tribune website is included in the lost productivity category.

Vinson said her search on the Ticketmaster website came from the wireless network on her smartphone while she was out at a meeting and that the category seems to be inaccurate "given that local and national educational news links are disseminated to county educational organizations for review on a daily basis."

Julian Union School District provided the web activity history for Superintendent Duffy within eight days. Email subject lines — even from his work account — were redacted.

Duffy, who viewed videos on Bill Nye's television show and Tim Tebow's arrival into baseball, said his daughter sent him the links via email to look at the inspirational content to share with his students.

"I know that pretty much everything I do is supposed to be transparent," he said. "That's part of being at a public school."

'No expectation of privacy'

In making requests for web-browsing data, U-T Watchdog first sought information about internet use policies at each of the government agencies.

Escondido has employees sign a consent form saying "all electronic messages and records maintained on my computer may be subject to disclosure pursuant to the California Public Records Act" and "users should have no expectation of privacy when using these computers."

The U-T then cited those policies, in addition to public records laws, in seeking web browsing histories. Despite that, records were not always forthcoming. Many agencies have the term "no expectation of privacy" in their web policies — and seven of those declined to hand over records.

The Lakeside Fire Protection District's technology-use policy informs employees that they forfeit any expectation of privacy in regard to any internet site accessed, transmitted, received or reviewed on any district

But in response to a request for Fire Chief Donald Butz's web activity, Administrative Services Manager Robert Schiwitz said he was not able to provide any records.

"We have discussed this with our information technology consultant and he did not believe that there were any records available based on this request," Schiwitz said by email.

David Snyder, executive director of an open-government advocacy group known as the First Amendment Coalition, said there could be issues with records retention requirements.

"As a general rule, government agencies are required to retain government records for at least two years, and I think these are public records," he said.

Some governments said they would not provide records of web activity, saying the public interest in keeping the records private outweighs the public interest in releasing them.

Caridad Sanchez, spokeswoman for the California Department of Transportation in San Diego, said web records are exempt from disclosure because they are a preliminary draft.

Darl Danford, legal specialist for the Poway Unified School District, said that web browsing history does not become public just because employees are told the information is not confidential.

"The policy makes all of the district's computer resources used by employees subject to being monitored by the district, not by the public," he said in an email.

Dominoe Franco, public records coordinator for San Diego State University, said the request was overly broad and sought documents protected by the "deliberative process exemption" of the California Public Records Act.

"Some of the information on the records would be exempt," Franco said. "If you want to ask for something specific on the web browser, we can review the request."

California State University San Marcos also cited the deliberative process exemption.

At the First Amendment Coalition, Snyder said there's nothing deliberative about visiting a website.

"I don't see how providing (web activity) somehow impedes agencies' ability to deliberate internally," Snyder said. "You're talking about one person's web browsing history — there's no deliberation there. There's no ongoing topic."

Three agencies have provided no records at all — not even web usage policies. Those are the Bonsall Union School District, Lakeside Water District and City of San Diego.






